The University of Calgary acknowledges the traditional territories of the people of the Treaty 7 region in Southern Alberta, which includes the Blackfoot Confederacy (comprising the Siksika, Piikani, and Kainai First Nations), as well as the Tsuut'ina First Nation and the Stoney Nakoda (including the Chiniki, Bearspaw, and Wesley First Nations). The City of Calgary is also home to the Métis Nation of Alberta, Region III. UCalgary is situated on land adjacent to where the Bow River meets the Elbow River, and the traditional Blackfoot name of this place is "Moh'kins'tsis," which we now call the City of Calgary.

pathways to university

Indigenous admissions

The University of Calgary acknowledges and respects the rich diversity of learners and of their communities, cultures, traditions, aspirations and abilities. In order to ensure equitable access and successful participation for Indigenous learners, UCalgary offers a number of bridging/pathway options for eligible students of Indigenous ancestry, i.e., First Nations (status and non-status), Métis and Inuit.

Students will be considered under all pathways provided they:

- are an Indigenous person of Canada — First Nations (status or non-status), Métis or Inuit; and
- 2. self-identify their Indigenous status in the application for admission.

Pathway options

Indigenous admissions process:

This pathway is for students who meet admission course requirements but are below the competitive admission average. These students may be considered up to 10 per cent (high school) or 0.3 GPA (transfer) below the annual admission average.

Indigenous admissions supplementary process:

This pathway is for students who don't meet course requirements.

Indigenous Student Access Program:

This one-year program provides an alternate access route. See page 7 for more details.

Students admitted through a pathway option will be required to verify their Indigenous ancestry prior to course registration.

High school

The general admission requirement for UCalgary is Alberta Grade 12 graduation, or equivalent, and the completion of English 30-1 and four other faculty-specific courses at the 30-level (or equivalent).

Transfer students

If you've attended an accredited/recognized postsecondary institution and have completed 12 or more academic units (four courses or more), you'll be considered for admission on the basis of your post-secondary academic standing.

Adult students

You can be considered for admission as an adult student if you're 21 years of age or older and have completed fewer than 12 units (fewer than four courses) of post-secondary study.

Indigenous Student Access Program (ISAP)

This one-year cohort-based program offers Indigenous students an alternate access route to gain admission to their desired program or additional supports as they transition to university studies. The cohort model helps build a sense of community and supports students with developing peer-to-peer relationships.

In this program, students take a combination of mandatory first-year university classes and classes relevant to their target degree programs. Courses taken in ISAP apply toward credit in degree programs.

Start your studies with support

ISAP equips students to learn by providing comprehensive supports, such as one-on-one academic advising, cultural workshops, leadership training and tutorials. Students are required to attend regularly-scheduled sessions in Writing Symbols Lodge to help them build academic skills, effective study habits and connections with mentors, Elders and other students. As the hub of Indigenous life on campus, Writing Symbols Lodge helps students succeed by providing a variety of services, facilities, programs and events.

Cultural events

Cultural events are offered throughout the school year and include pipe ceremonies, workshops, Indigenous Awareness Week, tea ceremonies, social gatherings and more.

Graduation celebration

Indigenous graduates participate in a traditional powwow that includes a Circle of Honour, where graduates are celebrated and receive ceremonial gifts.

Indigenous student leadership opportunities

Student employment, volunteer, mentorship and advisory opportunities are available.

Student facilities

Access a computer lab with a printer, the Indigenous Students' Council office, the Red Lodge Student Lounge, study space and a ceremonial room.

Student success, academic support and community building

Our programs and events are designed to support your academic and cultural needs. Examples include cultural crafting, pet therapy, connections to Traditional Knowledge Keepers, language cafés and more.

Awards for Indigenous students

Over \$17+ million in scholarships, bursaries and awards are available annually to all students. UCalgary offers many that are specific to Indigenous students. Examples include:

Writing Symbols Lodge Award

VALUE: \$10,000

Award eligibility

- Offered to a Canadian Indigenous undergraduate student entering any facult
- Renewable in the 2nd, 3rd and 4th year, provided the recipient maintains enrolment and achieves a minimum GPA of 2.6 over a minimum of 24 units in the previous fall and winter forms
- Based on academic merit

Elizabeth and Walter Fairey Bursary

VALUE: UP TO \$4,500

Award eligibility:

- Offered annually to a continuing undergraduate student in any facult
- Must be a Canadian Indigenous studen
- Preference given to a single parent

Métis Scholars Entrance Award

VALUE: UP TO \$5.000

Award eligibility

- Must be a Métis student and a resident of Alberta
- Offered annually to a continuing undergraduate student in any faculty
- Requires submission of a short essay that outlines reasons for the chosen field of study, how a Métis Scholars Entrance Award will impact the applicant's journey towards education and career objectives, and how the applicant is involved in the Métis community

Ellen McNeil Hamilton Bursary

VALUE: UP TO \$3,000

Award eligibility

- Offered annually to a continuing undergraduate student in any faculty
- Must be a Canadian Indigenous student.
- Need to have taken part in extra-curricular activities

Note: Awards have specific eligibility criteria that may not be listed

Applying for scholarships, bursaries and awards

By applying for admission, you're automatically considered for entrance awards. UCalgary also offers prestige awards and high school entrance awards, which you need to apply for through your Student Centre (mv.ucalgary.ca).


