Goals: By the end of this Symposium, participants will be equipped to:

1. Explain to themselves, colleagues, patients and families the difference between illness and disease, complaints and concerns.
2. Recognize the natural limitations of their capacity to understand the lives of their patients and their suffering and manage self-interventions to reach past these limits.
3. Recognize their own reactions to suffering, image that within the philosophical and psychologic and spiritual insights of humanities writing of the past two thousand years.
4. Plan to repair, with consultation with relevant resources, any damage to their own human frailty.
5. Identify and challenge shortcomings of colleagues and the healthcare system when they/it fail patients and society by applying too narrow and instrumental a focus on care.
6. Recognize reductionist thinking wherever it may lurk.

All sessions, including refreshment breaks, have been designed to ensure adequate time for questions and discussion.

Presentations will be a maximum of 15 minutes long allowing 5 minutes or more discussion thereafter.
