

UNIV 501.25 B01 Experiential Learning – International Insurance Markets

Course Outline – Spring 2026 (Draft)

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Prerequisites/Corequisites: Consent of the Student's faculty.

Course Description

An application of theory in a community or workplace setting.

This course, when taken in conjunction with RMIN559.02: International Insurance Markets, is designed to focus a student's attention on the details of the business environment and cultural differences in London and Bermuda while visiting those global insurance markets.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will:

- 1. Learn about the London and Bermuda insurance markets (before travel) and consider how they differ from each other and from Canada.
- 2. Experience a variety of facets of the culture and environment in Bermuda and London while participating in RMIN559.02.
- 3. Reflect on those experiences and how culture and environment shape different facets of how business is conducted.
- 4. Reflect on the experiences in Bermuda and London both formal business meetings and informal networking - and develop an awareness for what is important to you in a work environment and what corporate values align with your personal values.

Class Preparation & Desire2Learn (D2L)

RMIN 559.02 is a co-requisite for this course.

Students are expected to attend all sessions and engage with classmates, their professor, and professionals while in London and Bermuda and reflect on their experiences. D2L will be used for information about the course and assignments and Dropbox folders will be available for assignments.

Textbook and/or **Other Materials** and Resources

Required materials: There are no required textbooks for this class.

Assignments and **Evaluation**

Students in the class are required to:

- a) Pre-departure journal: Before departing on the travel portion of RMIN559.02, reflect on what you expect to experience in the weeks of travel. Write your thoughts down in the form of a pre-departure journal entry (more details will be available on D2L0.
- b) Interact with peers (other students and recent graduates, alumni) in each of the destination locations.
- c) Interact with senior managers and other professionals in businesses in each of the destination locations.
- d) Participate in at least one social activity in each location outside the activities organized for the class.
- e) Participate in at least one cultural activity in each location outside the activities organized for the class. *Hint: The museums and theatre in London* are incredible.
- f) Based on the above, keep a daily journal from departure till returning to Calgary and write a reflection essay after returning.

Deliverables for the class: (Travel dates: June 7 -21)

1. Due Prior to Departure (May 29)

Your pre-departure journal entry should describe what you expect to experience in the 2 weeks of travel. Write your thoughts down in the form of a journal entry (2 to 3 double-spaced pages with 11-point font). Specifically, consider:

- The impact of local culture on businesses (think about how London and Bermuda differ), how business is transacted, and how this differs from Canada.
- What do you expect to learn during the travel portion of the course?
- How do you think this experience will contribute to your personal and professional growth?
- Do you have any concerns about traveling? How can you prepare yourself for them?

- Do you have any concerns about the meetings you will attend in Bermuda and London? If so, what are they? Are there things you can do to prepare yourself and address your concerns?
- Briefly discuss the *two* things that you are most looking forward to during the 2 weeks.
- What is <u>one</u> personal quality that you possess that will be important for you to make the most of this educational experience. Briefly explain.
- 2. Due June 16 (within 3 days of returning to Calgary).

NOTE: It's important you journal every day beginning with departure day. Your journal should be computer generated. Photos may be included but are optional.

- i. A copy of a *daily journal* describing activities and observations **from** the date of departure to the date of return. Include (at a minimum) for each of the companies you visited, who you met with, the main topics covered, and something about what you learned or what made the visit interesting. Include at least one recommendation (specifically related to the company visits) regarding any changes that you think would make the experience better.
- ii. As part of your journal, **choose** at least one session in London and one session in Bermuda to provide a more detailed account of the companies you visited (make sure these are clearly marked in your journal). Specifically, describe what you learned, why it was a valuable experience, and what you learned about company culture and values based on your visit. Note any of the companies that you believe are a good fit in terms of your personal values and goals (this will be important in your essay).

3. **Due June 25**

An essay (5-6 double-spaced pages with 11-point font) prepared at least one week after returning home that reflects on your experience. It is important for this to be an honest, genuine reflection. Please do not make things up or exaggerate. Take time to consider what you personally learned and the value of the meetings you had as well as the entire experience.

The essay should discuss reflections such as:

- What did you learn about the approach different companies take regarding how they market themselves (to visitors such as you)? You may want to briefly describe different approaches and your reaction to them. What does this say about their company brand and culture? What approach resonated most with you and why?
- How did your experiences at the various companies influence your opinions about the risk management and insurance industry (good or bad) and business in general? Give specific examples and describe how your experience may influence the type of company where you wish to work.

Briefly comment on which company you would choose to work at if you were able to choose any one and explain why.

How are the expectations and styles of managers in the two destinations similar to those you have met in Canada (if you have relevant experience)? How are they different? How do they differ from each other?

- Describe how the social and cultural activities that you participated in may influence the person you will become in the future, and how they will they shape the business person you will become.
- What was the most challenging part of the trip? Briefly explain why.
- What was the most beneficial part of the trip? Describe why.
- What was the most enjoyable part of the trip? Briefly explain why.
- What advice would you give future students who take this course?

Final Exam

There is no final exam for this course.

Assessment of Writing

Writing skills are not exclusive to English courses and, in fact, should cross all disciplines.
